# The Hundred-Year History of the Takarazuka Revue



## 1914-1922

The years of formation: The Takarazuka Girls Revue gave its first performance in "Paradise Theater," a stage converted from an indoor pool.

- 1921: Formation of Flower Troupe and Moon Troupe.



### 1923-1933

The theater company put on the first revue in Japan and the Takarazuka Revue became a nationwide phenomenon.

- 1927: Performance of "Mon Paris," the first revue in Japan.
- 1924: Formation of Snow Troupe.
- 1933: Formation of Star Troupe.



#### 1934-1950

Although affected by the war, the Takarazuka Revue strived to stage performances during this dark era.  $\,$ 



### 1951-1961

- 1955: First use of wireless microphones in Japan during the performance of "Kismet" by the Flower Troupe.



#### 1962-1981

The Takarazuka Revue began staging Broadway musicals and enjoyed an unprecedented boom in popularity.

- 1974: First performance of "The Rose of Versailles," a representative work of the Takarazuka Revue.





# 1982-1994

The theater company enjoyed continued growth and opened the new Takarazuka Grand Theater in Hyogo prefecture.



### 1995-2004

The Takarazuka Revue moved on to the next stage with the formation of the five-troupe system.

- 1998: Formation of the youngest troupe, Cosmos Troupe.



# 2005-2014

Even after a century of theater, the Takarazuka Revue continues to grow and take on new challenges.
